Your choice is to have nothing to do with Nathan ever again or you can Engage in the process and see where the Holy Spirit leads you.

The growth and development spiritually that I have seen at St. David's since November is absolutely incredible. I can only imagine if we truly engage with the process where we will be in six months.

I understand that the idea of seeing Nathan, of speaking to him can bring strong emotions. I understand that there is fear, anger and hurt. That is why all I can ask from you is that you try to engage in the process you never know where the Holy Spirit is going to burn you up!

God wants us to live relationally, it is vital to our faith and wellbeing as creations of God. The scriptures are filled with charges to forgive and reconcile with others. Our goal is to see God is every person; and be able to treat them like you see God.

The only way to truly do this is to engage.

The coming months will be difficult. But I have faith that will the Holy Spirit and God we will make it through stronger and our faith deeper than ever before. I am so proud of y'all!

Whitsunday

Whitsunday (or Pentecost) is one of the principal feasts of the Christian church, celebrated on the 50th day after Easter, to commemorate the descent of the Holy Spirit on the disciples. The day became one of the three baptismal seasons, and the name Whitsunday is now generally attributed to the white garments formerly worn by the candidates for baptism.

Pentecost (Shavuos) is a feast of the Jews, celebrated on the 50th day after Passover. The word Pentecost is of Greek origin (pentekoste hemera) and translates into "fiftieth Day." Whitsunday is connected with the Jewish Pentecost not only in the historical date of its origin, but also in the underlying idea. The Jewish festival is one of thanks for the first fruits of the earth, the Christian for the first fruits of the spirit.

Slick with rain, the blacktop road was an accident waiting to happen. The old 1927 Nash's mechanical brakes did not take hold evenly. Dad did his best, but the car skidded off onto the shoulder. His effort to correct it did not work, and the car went up an embankment, slid back down, and, top-heavy at best, tipped over on its side.

Pennsylvania Dutch farmers appeared almost instantly, helping us climb out, and we began walking to their home. Amazingly, there were no serious injuries.

Taking care of us in their wonderful kitchen, giving us something warm to eat and drink, one of the men said to me, "Look at your shoes." I looked down and gave them an expert four-year-old's inspection. There were dark holes burned in the tops of my little two-buckle wing-tips. There were similar holes in my shirt pocket. "Looks like battery acid", someone said. It seems, the battery was under the floor, just in front of where I had been sitting in the back seat.

"Look out the window", someone said. Several men had gathered around our car, which lay on its side. They took hold of it and all together heaved it back up on its wheels.

We all got in, and though the wheel alignment had been skewed, Dad was able to cripple it in to Buffalo where Uncle Leslie had a Chrysler-Plymouth agency. Dad traded it in for a brand new 1938 Plymouth, which, by the way, had a more modern hydraulic brake system.

We continued our trip to northern New York to the farm of my Grandparents.

I will never forget those holes in my very best shoes. Later, as I thought back, I remembered something very much more important, the caring love of the 'Pennsylvania Dutch'. We may not get to help in such a crisis, but there may be other ways we can show such love this summer.

Work on the Chapel Garden Shifts to Landscaping

The Chapel Garden has shifted to its landscaping phase as the committee works toward a plan to arrange the garden with a variety of plantings, both in the Garden where cremains may be scattered and along Highway 135 where a screen against traffic noise and sights will soften the memorial experience of churchyard burial.

Ed Kasena has the lead for the committee in the design and plant selection of the landscaping. Jane and David Savage are planning the highway screening.

With the staining of the alternate panels of the Commonbarium patio to give it more of an artistic feel, we have completed the Commonbarium feature of the Garden We have on hand the additional back plates to hold a total of eighty names, a number we don't foresee a need for in a good long while. We also recently installed the continuation of a safety railing along the sidewalk from the Gathering Place rear deck to the walk leading to the Commonbarium. We are grateful once again to the skill and artistry of Ian Miller for the concrete work and Jim Connor for the metalwork at the altar and the new railing.

A series of nine educational yard signs are in use on request around the Chapel Garden to identify the purposes, features, and spirituality that the Garden has been created to share. The signs are currently being used during the Farmers' Market Fridays, and on other occasions and services as requested.

St. David's now has a process for interment of cremains, either by pouring them through the center of the altar and the symbolic Tree of Life into a vault below or scattering them within the landscaping of the Chapel Garden. Records of those interred in the Chapel Garden are maintained by St. David's Use of the Chapel Garden is available to members and friends of St. David's according to guidelines being prepared for vestry approval.

Please speak with Mtr. Kelsey Hutto to plan for use of the Chapel Garden at the end of life. St. David's regularly makes time to discuss end of life issues and has a Caring Booklet available for planning.
